2024 SCHOLASTIC ART AWARDS DISCOVER TALENTED TEEN ARTISTS IN NORTHERN NEVADA

The Nevada Museum of Artists proudly announces students in Northern Nevada who have won the 2024 Scholastic Art Awards, the nation's longest-running and most prestigious competitive scholarship opportunity for creative teens.

WHAT:

This year, 567 student-artists from Northern Nevada in grades 7-12 have been recognized for their creativity and artistry in the annual Scholastic Art Awards. Five students in Northern Nevada are American Visions Nominees: Anastasia Treadway (Grade 9, Sage Ridge School), Cali Surtees (Grade 12, Reno High School), Kellan Pendola (Grade 12, Douglas High School), Jordan Hoffman (Grade 12, Douglas High School), and Dasha Derevianko (Grade 12, Galena High School). These students are eligible to compete at the National level, the results of which will be announced in June 2024.

THE EXHIBTION:

A joint exhibition featuring select Gold Key Works and American Visions Nominated works is on view through February 28, 2024 at the Sheppard Contemporary Gallery in the Church of Fine Arts Building on the UNR Main campus and in the E.L. Cord Museum School at the Nevada Museum of Art.

THE AWARDS CEREMONY:

An official Scholastic Art Award Ceremony is scheduled for **Thursday, February 15, 2024 from 6-7 pm** at the Nightingale Concert Hall, UNR Main Campus. During the ceremony, American Visions winners will offer brief remarks; all regional Scholastic Art Award recipients will be recognized and honored. Artist Remy Glock, a Reno native and Scholastic Art Awards alumni, will be the featured speaker during the awards presentation.

ABOUT THE SCHOLASTIC ART AWARDS:

For over a century, the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards have encouraged the passions, talents, and perspectives of millions of teens, validating their creative abilities and the belief that their voices matter. Alumni of the scholarship program include Tschabalala Self, Stephen King, Kay WalkingStick, José Parlá, Amanda Gorman, Charles White, Joyce Carol Oates, and Andy Warhol, all of whom received recognition through the program as teens.

Since 1999, the Nevada Museum of Art has overseen the Northern Nevada regional visual arts component of the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, honoring exceptional middle and high school students from Carson City, Churchill, Douglas, Elko, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lyon, Mineral, Pershing, Story, Washoe, and White Pine counties. Students submitting original work to the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards follow in the footsteps of distinguished Awards alumni including Andy Warhol, Truman Capote, Sylvia Plath, Richard Avedon and Reno's own Michael Sarich.
