



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## Dorothea Lange: Seeing People

APRIL 12, 2025 - FEBRUARY 15, 2026


During her long, prolific, and groundbreaking career, the American photographer Dorothea Lange (1895–1965) made some of the most iconic portraits of the 20th century. *Dorothea Lange: Seeing People* reframes her work through the lens of portraiture, highlighting her unique ability to reveal the character and resilience of those she photographed.

Featuring 100 photographs, the exhibition addresses Lange's innovative approaches to picturing people, emphasizing her work on social issues at the forefront of the Great Depression including economic disparity, migration, poverty, and racism.

This exhibition debuted at the National Gallery of Art in 2023 and is curated by Philip Brookman, Consulting Curator in the Department of Photographs.

### When Langston Hughes Came to Town

MAY 3, 2025 - FEBRUARY 15, 2026

When Langston Hughes Came to Town explores the history and legacy of Langston Hughes in the Harlem Renaissance and highlights his largely unknown travels to Nevada during the Great Depression. James Mercer Langston Hughes (1901—1967) was one of leading writers of the Harlem Renaissance, with a distinctive style inspired by jazz rhythms. Hughes documented all facets of Black culture but was renowned for his incisive poetry.

This exhibition explores Langston Hughes's connection to Nevada through archival photographs, ephemera, and short stories inspired by his visits to the state. It also showcases works by Harlem Renaissance artists linked to Hughes, including Augusta Savage, Meta Vaux Warrick Fuller, Beauford Delaney, Aaron Douglas, Norman Lewis, and Archibald Motley, Jr., highlighting the era's vibrant and resilient culture. Contemporary artists inspired by Hughes, such as Isaac Julien, Kwame Brathwaite, Glenn Ligon, and Deborah Willis, are paired with Hughes's poetry, illustrating his enduring influence and leaving viewers to ponder resilience and belonging in America.

This exhibition is organized by the Nevada Museum of Art and curated by Carmen L. Beals, Associate Curator and Outreach Director, Las Vegas.
